



> The Maritime Museum features significant historic objects and vessels that highlight WA's sporting, sailing and adventure heritage, including the America's Cup winning yacht, Australia II and Jon Sanders' Parry Endeavour. Discover the vast riches of Western Australia's maritime history.

10.30 am Free time in the city of Fremantle

Self-Guided exploration with many attractions to visit such as:

### The Round House

The Roundhouse is the Swan River Colony's first civil gaol and oldest public building in the State of Western Australia. Opened in January 1831, just 18 months after settlement, it was built to hold any person convicted of a crime in the settlement and was used until 1886. From here there are beautiful views over the harbour and Bathers Beach. The Canon is fired daily at 1 pm.

### WA Shipwrecks Museum

Recognised as the foremost maritime archaeology museum in the southern hemisphere. Located on Whadjuk Nyoongar land, the 1850s-era Commissariat building is home to galleries featuring relics from ships wrecked along WA's treacherous coastline.

12.00 pm Optional Group Lunch (Own Cost) and Informal Farewell - Norfolk Hotel The stone-built hotel was constructed in 1887 before the 1893 Kalgoorlie gold rush for George Alfred Davies, a vintner, local councillor and Mayor of Fremantle. For most of its life it was known as the Oddfellows Hotel.

Self-Guided exploration with many attractions to visit such as:

#### Fremantle Prison and Store

Fremantle Prison was built by convict labour between 1852 and 1859 using limestone quarried on the site. The first prisoners moved into the main cell block in 1855. It was used as a convict barracks in the 19th century and remained in continual use until 1991. The Prison was a place of hangings, floggings, dramatic convict escapes and prisoner riots. Inmates included imperial convicts, colonial prisoners, enemy aliens, prisoners of war and maximum-security detainees.

### Fremantle Arts Centre

Built by convicts in 1864 as the Fremantle Lunatic Asylum and Invalid Depot, FAC now hosts exhibitions, concerts, workshops, a cafe and gift shop.

#### Monument Hill and Fremantle War Memorial

The highest point in Fremantle (only 43m!) offers an amazing panoramic view of the city, harbour and ocean. It's also home to Fremantle War Memorial.

#### Fremantle Markets

First opened in 1897, the markets capture the atmosphere of the Victorian era.

Over 150 stalls offer fresh produce, jewellery, souvenirs, fashion and home wares.

### Little Creatures Brewery

Housed on the water's edge in Fremantle in a huge shed (and former crocodile farm!) is one of Australia's best known craft brewery. Book in a brewery tour at 3pm then finish your sightseeing day with a tasting paddle and a pizza.
